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HISTORY OF PRESENTATION PRIMARY SCHOOLS

In 1908, the Archbishop, Most Reverend John Healy asked the Presentation Order in Tuam to set up a convent in Athenry and to teach in the Girls School, at the urgent request of the Parish Priest, Canon Canton. He vacated his own house and gave it to the nuns as their new convent. Two of the nuns started teaching immediately in the primary school situated in Abbey Row. In 1910 the first Presentation Primary School was opened. The school which was called the Sacred Heart School was situated at the back of the convent and accommodated 150 pupils. Sr. Paul was the first Principal. Due to rising numbers another classroom was built in 1912. The numbers on roll were rising rapidly in the mid sixties hence another room was built onto the school. In 1976 a new school building was finalised between the Presentation Sisters and the Commissioners of Public Works, the site being provided by the Presentation Sisters.

The second Presentation Primary School was officially opened on the 4th of September 1980, with Sr. Kevin as Principal and 290 pupils on roll. The school is called after the Sacred Heart of Jesus, hence its name Scoil Chroí Naofa. Sr. Eithne Cunniffe succeeded Sr. Kevin as Principal. In 1993, Teresa Neylon was appointed as the first lay Principal with 273 pupils on roll. The school was extended in 2010 consisting of one classroom with a corridor, two offices, a stairs, four toilets, and a linking corridor between the school and the new classroom. In 2013, our school has transferred ownership from the Presentation Sisters to the Tuam Diocese. In November 2018 following Mrs Neylon's retirement, Mr. Fergal Naughton was appointed as the first male principal. At present there are 353 pupils enrolled. There are twenty five members of staff, i.e. thirteen class teachers, four special education teachers, two special need assistants, three supply panel teachers, the principal, secretary and caretaker.

PHILOSOPHY OF OUR SCHOOL

Scoil Chroí Naofa is a Presentation school. It is a Christian Catholic group of pupils, parents, staff and management. We share a similar vision. We live out the Christian message by handing on the Faith and Christian values. Nano Nagle was the foundress of the Presentation Order. Inspired by her vision, our Presentation school gives priority to:

- Providing pupils with an education for life and living
- Sharing and celebrating the vision of life.

Inspired by the vision of Nano Nagle, Foundress of the Presentation Order, the staff in Scoil Chroí Naofa aim to:

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

All schools operate under the Rules of National Schools, which are drawn up by the Minister for Education & Skills. The patron of our school is Archbishop Michael Neary of the Tuam diocese. The Board of Management is comprised of representatives of the patron, parents, teachers and the local community. They are elected every four years. The members of the Board of Management of Scoil Chroí Naofa are as follows

- Two members appointed by the patron; Bernie Ryan and Fr. Benny McHale.
- Two parents, a mother and a father of children in the school; Joanne Melia Costello and Paul Fitzgerald.
- The principal and a teacher representative; Fergal Naughton and Cathriona Cronin.
- Two members from the community elected by the Board of Management; Stefanie Moynihan and Fergal Melia.

PARENTS' COUNCIL

The Parent's Council is the structure through which parents can work together for the best possible education for their children. We have a very active Parents Council in our school. Parents volunteer to become members of the Council at our Annual General Meeting in early October. There are also two parents on the Board of Management and two members of the teaching staff on the Council. There are approximately six meetings in the year.

The aims of the Parents' Council are as follows;

- To represent the views of parents
- To inform parents of developments in education and in school.
- To foster co-operation between parents, teachers and school management.
- To liaise with parents on the Board of Management.
- To help with the provision of extra equipment and teaching aids.
- To help parents from a monetary point of view.
- To organise talks and discussions on topics of interest for parents.
- To provide a forum for debate and discussion on matters that are of interest to them and their children.

STUDENT COUNCIL

Sixth class are the members of the Student Council under the leadership of Mrs. Monson. The role of the Student Council is as follows;

- To mind the Junior classes during break times
- To assist the School Management Team with organising the younger classes at whole school events e.g. start of school term, church masses, Monster walk to school days, Grandparents day etc.
- To make positive changes to the school environment

- To be a link with our School Community
- The following are some of the wonderful activities they have been involved in this year; The Junior Entrepreneur Programme, Organising Christmas Decorations for Athenry Christmas Trees, fundraising for the Lourdes Pilgrimage Trust, taking part in a Craft and Knitting Display with the Knitting Club, organising a Bake Sale in aid of Athenry Tidy Towns and a second Bake Sale in aid of the Parents Council, Co-ordinating SCN Sports day etc.

STUDENT VOICE COMMITTEE

This year we have piloted a "Student Voice Committee" under the guidance of Mr Hanley. It is made up of 2 representatives from each of the senior classes (from 3rd up to 6th). The girls meet with Mr Hanley once every term to discuss what they would like to try new in the school and what they see is not working well for pupils. Mr Hanley takes these suggestions to the Staff Management meeting. Then at the next Student Voice Committee meeting Mr Hanley feeds back to the pupils which of their suggestions are possible and which are not. The girls in turn update their classes after the meeting. This gives the girls a flavour of how politics works!

GREEN SCHOOL PROGRAMME

Mrs Greally is the Green school Coordinator and is assisted by her Fourth & Fifth class. We have been awarded eight flags based on the following themes: Litter & Waste, Energy, Water, Travel, Biodiversity, Global Citizenship - Litter & Waste, Global Citizenship - Energy, and Global Citizenship - the Marine Environment. We are currently working on our 9th flag - Travel & Global Citizenship.

We all have a responsibility in looking after our environment and everyone can make a difference. We in Scoil Chroí Naofa have become friends of the environment by

- Keeping our school clean and tidy.
- Disposing of our waste in the correct bins.
- Cutting down on the use of single plastics
- Saving electricity.
- Making the best use of heat
- Conserving water in our school.
- Enhancing our school environment.
- Walking to school whenever we can or using Park and Stride
- Protecting biodiversity in our local area
- Thinking globally and acting locally
- Practising at home and in the locality of Athenry what we have learned in school.

DIVERSITY COMMITTEE

Mrs Hennessy is the Diversity Committee Co-Ordinator and her Fourth class are the committee. Their motto is Stand Up, Stand Strong and Stand Together. Their role is to welcome new children, parents and staff to our school community. The following are some of their duties; directing children to walk in a safe manner going in and out of the school during break times, buddying new children in the yard, friendship monitors, health & safety audit of the school yard, assisting at big events, e.g. Open Day, Grandparents Day, etc.

ACTIVE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Mr. McDonald is the Co-Ordinator & the Active School Committee is made up of his 3rd class. Their slogan is Be active! Keep active! Stay active! The Active School Committee has 3 aims:

- To make sure that everybody takes part in some kind of activity during or after school, e.g. walking, cycling, swimming, running or playing,
 - To help children be more active inside and outside of school. It is recommended that children have at least 60 minutes of activity every day.
 - To make sure we have fun while getting more active.
- We participated in a two year Active School Programme and received the Active School Flag. We have an Active School Week in June where children are encouraged to be active, at school and at play.
 - We also take part in the SuperTrooper Programme (run by Laya Health Care) which is designed to encourage children to be active for 60 minutes on a daily basis. The children are provided with homework activity journals which are filled with fantastic fun activities to do at home.
 - We took part in the Be Active School campaign during the European week of Sport. Each class took part in the "Run Around Europe" Challenge. The challenge consisted of all classes walking or running as many laps of the school yard as possible for 15 minutes per day (1 lap = 1km). Each child's total was recorded to make a class total. The total was then compared to the distances of capital cities in other countries from Ireland. This was plotted on the "Run Around Europe" Challenge Board displayed in the hall.
 - All classes are encouraged to take part in the Daily Mile. The Daily Mile consists of walking or running for 1 mile (1.6km) or for 15 minutes each day.
 - Many of the classes also go on "active" school tours e.g. "Let's Go" camps in Galway / Limerick and Baysports in Athlone.

HEALTHY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The motto of the Healthy School Committee is "Healthy Body Strong Mind Go Better Together". Our school implemented a two year Healthy School Programme a number of years ago and secured the Health Promoting School Award. The following are some of the activities that have become embedded in the school ethos as a result:

- We revised our healthy eating policy
- Our community is encouraged to drink more water.
- We became fruit and veg eaters as a result of the Food Dudes Programme.
- We enhanced our environment by painting a mural and games on playground.
- We highlight our school as a bullying free zone during Anti Bullying week

PARENT TEACHER COMMUNICATION

Good communication and co-operation between parents and teachers is fundamental to the development of a happy effective learning environment. If parents have any concern, they are advised to make an appointment. Formal parent teacher meetings are held during first term. School reports are issued at the end of the school year. Since September 2018 we no longer send home a paper copy of the school newsletter in the children's bags. Parents only receive newsletters by email. The newsletter will continue to be posted to the Website. Parents receive a calendar of school closures. Our school avails of the Text-a-parent Service. This service is used for unpredictable events, emergency contact, important reminders, meetings, etc.

PREPARATION FOR SCHOOL FOR THE JUNIOR INFANT

Starting school is a milestone in the life of a child. There are many ways in which parents can ensure that the transition from the relative freedom of home to the more structured school day is a smooth one. Some of this preparation should begin some months before the child starts and should be carried out gradually. Please note the following steps when enrolling your child:-

- Enrolment forms are available in the school from February each year.
- There is a Reception meeting / Open night in February for all the parents of children who are about to start school in September. At this meeting the policies of the school are explained and a summary of the Junior Infant Programme is outlined. Tips and guidelines in preparing your child for school are issued.
- The child visits the school for one afternoon in late June to meet the Principal and his/her teacher.

CODE OF BEHAVIOUR & DISCIPLINE

School Code

All pupils are expected to:

- Behave in a responsible manner towards themselves and others by showing consideration, courtesy and respect for other pupils and adults at all times.
- Show respect for the property of each individual and of the school at all times.
- Behave in a way, which will uphold the good name of the school at all times.

GOLDEN RULES

There are six Golden Rules in our school. If the children strive to keep the Golden Rules during the week, they are rewarded with Golden time on a Friday. Golden time is a very happy session where the children engage in very pleasant activities organised by the teachers as a reward for good behaviour. The following are our six Golden Rules;

School Rules

1. Food

- No nuts of any kind are allowed.
- Drinks are not allowed in the school yard.
- Children are required to bring nutritious lunches according to our Healthy Eating Policy
- Chewing gum, crisps, fizzy drinks and glass bottles are not allowed in the school

2. Pupils must be punctual at all times. School begins at 8.50am. Afternoon classes begin at 1pm. Junior and Senior Infants go home at 1.30pm. Pupils in First Class up to Sixth Class go home at 2.30pm. ***The Board of Management does not take responsibility for children in the school yard before 8.45pm or after 2.30pm unless they are attending extra-curricular classes.***

3. The following behaviour is strictly forbidden:-

- Shouting and running within the school building, loitering, vandalism, littering, rudeness, giving cheek, bad language, name calling, rough play, kicking, punching, throwing stones, scratching or scraping.
- All types of bullying including Cyber Bullying and Racial Bullying are unacceptable and strictly forbidden.

4. Uniform:
 - The correct full school uniform must always be worn with suitable, safe, flat footwear.
 - Long hair should always be tied back.
 - Make-up is strictly forbidden.
5. Jewellery must be kept to a minimum.
 - Only small safe earrings are acceptable i.e. studs, sleepers. No large hoops or long dangling earrings are allowed.
 - Nose jewellery is strictly forbidden.
 - Long necklaces or chains are not allowed.
 - Nails should be kept short. Long/False nails are forbidden.
6. Runners, tracksuits or shorts & t-shirts must be worn for Physical Education.
7. Children who have been absent from school must bring a written explanation to the teacher/principal.
8. Children must follow the safe route in and out of the school grounds, i.e. to enter through the stiles, to follow route set out by green fence, to walk behind the prefab and into playground or to enter from the upper playground.
9. During school hours children are not allowed to leave the school premises without permission from parents.
10. Children are not allowed into the school building during playtime without permission.
11. All types of mobile phones are forbidden

CURRICULUM

The curriculum taught in our school is Religious Education, English, Irish, Mathematics, Visual Arts, Music, Social Personal and Health Education, History, Geography, Science, Physical Education and Drama. Technology is used not only as a tool to enhance curricular areas but is also embedded in our teaching, learning and assessment. We use a range of technology to achieve this including e.g. iPads, Bee Bots. As Scoil Chroí Naofa is a Catholic school, Religious Education has a high priority in our school day. Assembly takes place every Monday with prayers and hymns. Second Class pupils make their First Confession and First Holy Communion. Sixth Class girls make their Confirmation. During the year the children from 3rd up to 6th class receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We also celebrate 2 special Masses together each year: we celebrate a mass on Nano Nagle's feast day in November and again at the end of the year we have a graduation mass for the graduating 1st class boys and 6th class girls.

HOMEWORK

The purpose of homework is:-

- To give the children an opportunity to work individually, practice what they have learned, find out things for themselves and give them the good habit of work.
- To give parents an opportunity to work with their child and to keep them informed of what is being done in school and of their own child's progress.

Children in Junior and Senior Infant Classes get Oral work, Reading, Writing and Maths depending on the class ability and age of the child. The type of homework a child gets from 1st class to 6th class is Spellings, Tables, Maths, Religion, Reading, Writing, Memory work and Research work. There are times when other homework is given e.g. History, Geography, Science and Music.

STAY SAFE PROGRAMME

The Stay Safe Programme is taught in all classes every second year. The aim of the programme is to teach children personal safety skills, so they can look after themselves in situations which could be upsetting or dangerous. It deals initially with common situations, which most children will experience at some stage or other, e.g. getting lost or being bullied. The programme also teaches children the safety skills necessary to protect themselves from physical or sexual abuse. Children are taught to tell a trusted adult about any problems they may have.

MUSIC

- We have a very active vibrant band called the Medieval Town Band. Children from second to sixth class are members of the band. They learn a repertoire of music and routines. They play tin whistles, melodicas, bell lyres, accordions and percussion instruments. Children have the opportunity to learn four instruments during their time in our school. They perform at local events during the school year, e.g. the Lighting of the Christmas Tree and St Patrick's Day Parade.
- Children take part in many Choral Events during the year. They sing at Morning Assemblies, Masses, Prayer Services, Concerts, etc. Senior classes have taken part in the National Children's Choir, Peace Proms Choir and the Hallelujah Choir. All the children perform at our Christmas Gala School Concert every second year.

SPORT

- Mr Naughton, Mrs Burke, Ms. Tyrrell, Miss Feeney, Mr. Hanley, Mrs Greally and Mrs Hennessy are Camogie Co-ordinators for our school. They organise and support all Camogie Events. They coach the Camogie Team. The pupils compete in the Cumann na mBunscoil League, the INTO Mini 7's and the Athenry Schools Camogie Blitz each year. The G.A.A. Galway Coaching Games Committee also send coach Gerry Spellman to our school to train selected classes.
- Mr Naughton and Mr. Mc Donald select children to participate in the following four Athletics competitions during the year; Galway Primary School Cross Country Running Competition, Cumann na mBunscoil Cross Country Competition, Cumann na mBunscoil Galway County Primary School Sports and the Community Games Relay Competitions.
- Mr Naughton coaches Basketball to senior pupils as an Extra Curricular Activity and selects teams to participate in an annual Basketball Blitz in Cregmore.
- Providing a variety of sporting experiences is at the essence of sport provision in Scoil Chroí Naofa. This is a deliberate decision by management to ensure that the needs of all and not just some pupils are catered for. Consequently this year pupils also engaged in Gaelic football, Tag rugby and Soccer.
- Sixth Class organise a variety of activities for our annual Sports Day in Kenny Park, which takes place in June.
- Third class attend Swimming Lessons for one week every year.
- John Burke from the Football Association of Ireland provided a six week course on Soccer to the fourth class.
- Over the last few years TY students from Coláiste an Eachreidh coached Spike Ball to 5th & 6th class. The girls then participated in a Spike Ball Blitz in Clarin College.
- Sixth class participate in an annual Cycle Safety Training Course.

DISCOVERY SCIENCE TECHNOLOGY ENGINEERING & MATHS PROGRAMME

Our school has participated in the Discovery Science Programme for many years under the stewardship of Ms Tyrrell. We have been awarded five Discovery Science Awards of Excellence, five Discovery Science & Maths Awards of Excellence and four Discovery Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths Awards of Excellence.

- This year for World Space Week we talked about The Moon. We learnt about Neil Armstrong. We talked about how scientists are really looking at what they can do in Space to make it liveable for humans. They are trying to figure out how they can become astrofarmers. What type of food could they grow in space?
- So after thinking about growing food in Space, we started to think about what food would taste like in Space. What do we use to taste food? WELL when astronauts go to space, their taste changes. Why? It was all very interesting & the children learnt lots of facts.

- We even had our first Skype call in Scoil Chroí Naofa this year. Aisling Shannon talked to Scoil Chroí Naofa about her career as a Structural Engineer at the European Space Agency. Aisling is based in The Netherlands. The site she works on is called ESTEC (European Space research and Technology Centre) which is one of the 6 main sites for ESA. Her role is to ensure that the spacecraft gets to where it needs to go without breaking!
- For Science week we all carried out lots of experiments in our classroom. Check out our blog to see all the fun. Ms Tyrrell organised a K'nex workshop to come to our school. The children got to make really cool designs.
- This year for Engineers week, Ms Tyrrell has organised for a "Dam Busters" workshop to come to our school. The pupils will design, construct and test a dam constructed by themselves. They will have a strict budget to "buy" their materials. Also, an overall project manager will be elected to oversee its construction and testing. They will be able to compare and contrast their designs with their fellow students and suggest ways of improving on their projects.
- We also have a Lego workshop for the Junior & Senior Infants. They absolutely loved this workshop last year. They were so excited & they got to make electric cars.
- The children were also encouraged to imagine, design & create their own engineering projects.
- For Maths week the children got to go on Maths trails around the school and played Maths games

BUSINESS PROGRAMMES

Mrs Monson's 6th class took part in the Junior Entrepreneur Programme (JEP) for the third time last year. JEP is an entrepreneurial awareness & skills enhancement programme for primary school children over a 12 week period. The children were encouraged to become critical thinkers, to identify a diverse range of strengths & talents, to engage in teamwork & collaboration and to reflect on their learning. This programme brings real life business learning to children. It nurtures creativity, independence and problem solving among the pupils. At the start of the process local businesswoman Michelle Healy-Leggett (from Coffee Doc) spoke to the girls about setting up a business. Over the 12 weeks the children came up with their own business ideas out of which five ideas were selected. The ideas were presented to our three dragons: Mr Naughton, Mrs Cronin and Nele Uske (local photographer). The winning product chosen was "Minimals". The next phase was design and costings. The school gave a start-up loan of €160. Then there was a very busy week of production where the 6th class room was turned into a hive of activity. Finally the product was showcased & sold to the whole school and the girls raised over €1,330. They paid back their €160 loan. The remaining profits were divided between the 6th class girls. Each girl made €45 approx. It was a fantastic programme and an overall great learning experience for all involved. The class have been awarded a flag, a plaque and certificates in recognition of all their commitment, dedication and hard work.

INFORMATION & COMMUNICATIONS TECHNOLOGY

Our IT Journey to date

- In 2013, we received the Digital Schools Award which recognises excellence in our approach to the integration of Information & Communications Technology (ICT) in learning, teaching and in administration.
- In 2014, we secured a second award called the Digital Schools of Distinction Award, in acknowledgement of our high standards as an e-learning school.
- In 2018, we engaged with the Digital Learning Framework to further drive standards in IT in our school.
- Our whole school target in IT for 2019/2020 is that our pupils will actively engage with digital resources, appropriate to their class level, to develop their language skills and create curricular-based digital content.
- Ms Murray is our IT Co-Ordinator and oversees planning in this area as well as the purchase and maintenance of equipment

The Digital Technologies in use in our school:

- WIFI is available throughout the school
- Classroom teachers have access to the following: an Interactive Whiteboard, Smart Notebook Software, teacher and pupil laptops, class printer and photocopier, cordless keyboards and mouse, visualisers, iPads and Apple TV
- Interactive whiteboards are used by teachers and pupils to interact with online resources such as Bua na Cainte / Jolly Phonics / CJ Fallon resources.
- There are a total of thirty pupil iPads and one teacher iPad which are available to each of the classes in the school. An additional six iPads are available to the Special Education Team for use in in-class literacy and numeracy programmes. All iPads are stored in mobile iPad storage trolleys with accompanying headphones.
- Class teachers have access to specific iPads with keyboards for blogging and for capturing photos and video footage
- A tripod and mount for an iPad is available to teachers creating videos. A Green Screen pack is also available which includes a stand to hang the green sheet from. The Green Screen App is installed on all iPads.

How Technology is used in our School:

- iPads are used by pupils to play curricular-based games to reinforce literacy and maths skills and concepts
- iPads are also used to research information online for curricular-based work in middle and senior classes
- BeeBots are used by Junior and Senior Infants during Aistear. Bee-Bot is a programmable floor robot. Pupils enter instructions to move forward or backward in 15

cm steps or to turn right or left. When they press the <Go> button, the robot moves as instructed. All Junior classes have a Bee-Bot floor mat for use with their robots.

- Literacy and mathematics apps are used in all classes to reinforce concepts and skills in the areas of Literacy and Numeracy
- In 1st - 4th class, pupils use the Book Creator App to create digital content
- In 3rd - 6th class, pupils engage in cross-curricular projects where they access information online as part of the research process
- iMovie is used in 5th & 6th class to create short movies. Pupils work collaboratively in groups to create their movies. They use the Green Screen app in conjunction with iMovie
- 5th & 6th class pupils are currently engaging in an app-smash project where they will create content in iMovie and embed it into the Story Creator app to create a digital book on a chosen curricular topic
- The senior classes participate in Paired iPad sessions with our junior classes
- Special Education Teachers (SETs) use a variety of software and apps to meet the specific learning needs of pupils receiving support.
- On-line safety is of paramount importance in SCN. In light of this, we organise regular Internet Safety talks / workshops for the pupils, staff and parents.

Our Media Platforms:

- Mrs Cronin moderates our school website and all other SCN media platforms. We invite you to visit our school website on www.scoilchroinaofaathenry.ie. The website includes many useful features for parents most noticeably "The Parents Portal" which will keep you up-to-date with our school diary and calendar, newsletters and important policies and tips for working with your child. Our website also boasts a very active school blog which is updated regularly and will keep you up-to-date with all the wonderful activities taking place in SCN.
- We launched our very own YouTube Channel under the guidance of Krzysztof Bronowicki in 2018. This exciting facility allows us to upload group school videos for you to watch at home and for our pupils to watch in school. It is our way of sharing some fantastic things your children do and experience in school with you. UNIFORM

It is important to foster a pride in the school and to make the children feel part of it. The uniform is worn in the school at all times.

- The girls wear a navy pinafore with our school crest, blue check shirt, navy tie, white/navy socks/tights and a navy cardigan with a light blue stripe on the cuff and waistband.
- The boys wear navy trousers, blue check shirt, tie and dark coloured socks, navy jumper with our school crest and a light blue stripe around the neck and on the cuff and waistband.
- Please note
 - Plain pinafores and jumpers without crest are not acceptable.
 - Navy cardigans and jumpers must have the correct light blue stripes.
- Our full uniform can be purchased in National Schoolwear Centre, Centre Point, Liosbán, Galway or Anthony Ryan's Shop, Shop Street, Galway
- Please make sure you write your child's name on all items of the uniform.
- If your child has outgrown his/her uniform and you have no further use for it, we would very much appreciate if you would donate it to the school, as we keep a supply for children who come to the school for short periods and for those who have financial difficulty.
- Your child will also need runners for Physical Education lessons.
- Children require old large shirts for Visual Art lessons.

BOOKS

A number of books will be available on a rental scheme. Books on loan from school will need to be returned in good condition. Pupils are required to treat books with respect. If books are mislaid, they will need to be replaced. Booklists are available in June. Children should have their books by the first school day of September, so work can begin immediately. Books should be covered, labelled and kept clean.

HEALTHY EATING

- The school acknowledges that foods should not be labelled as 'good' or 'bad' but that within the school grounds, children staff and parents make every effort to eat foods which benefit health, growth and development of the child.
- Healthy Eating forms part of the SPHE curriculum and is taught in all classes.
- All children are encouraged to eat a well balanced lunch during the day.
- All children are encouraged to drink fluids during the school day.
- Children have two breaks every day when they are encouraged to slowly eat and enjoy the contents of their lunch box.
- Lunch boxes should contain a drink, sandwich, fruit/veg and dairy product etc.
- All chocolate products are forbidden during school hours, e.g. nutella, chocolate yogurts, sprinkles of chocolate, chocolate coated biscuits, chocolate flavoured drinks, chocolate chip cookies, etc.
- Treat foods have a limited role in a healthy diet. The school will provide a treat food on special occasions such as end of term, feast days. Parents are asked not to provide treat foods for birthdays etc.

Safety

- All children are supervised by staff at all breaks.
- Our school is a nut free zone. Some children suffer from severe nut allergy. Parents are requested not to provide any nut products including nuts, nut butters, chocolate spreads.
- Glass bottles are forbidden.
- Foods should be the appropriate size and texture for junior classes. Par boil carrots and chop fruit to bite size pieces if required.
- Ensure lunchboxes are emptied & washed in warm soapy water & dried after each day.

Practical

- Older children help junior classes during lunch breaks.
- To decrease packaging and litter, all children are requested to have:
 - A lunch box for their food
 - Flasks or plastic screw top bottles for drinks
- The Green School Committee request that
 - Tinfoil and cling film are kept to a minimum and brought home
 - Plastic bottles are reused.

HEALTH ISSUES

- The principal and the teacher should be informed if your child has a medical need or an allergy which might affect him/her at school.
- If your child needs medicine, you are required to inform the Board of Management in writing and to complete an Administration of Medicine Form. The staff may then administer medicine with the consent of the Board of Management.
- If a child becomes ill in school, parents will be contacted immediately. Please make sure you forward to the school a contact number for the following: home, work and a family member/neighbour/friend.
- If a child is seriously injured the Doctor will be called immediately and the parents/guardians will be contacted. In the case of cuts or minor injuries the child will be given First Aid.

CHILD PROTECTION ISSUES

The Board of Management of Scoil Chroí Naofa have published their Child Safe Guarding Statement. If there is a matter of concern in relation to harm and abuse of children, we are obliged to report this to Tusla who will assess the case and provide the necessary support.

In accordance with the Education Welfare Act 2000, when a pupil is absent for part or all of a school day, parents must notify the teacher/principal. If a pupil is absent for more than 20 days during the school year, the school authorities must inform the Education Welfare Board.

SAFETY

The school endeavours to provide a safe environment. Children should behave in a way, which does not endanger themselves or others. The Board of Management have introduced a safe system for entering and leaving the school grounds.

- All cars should be parked outside the school grounds, in the car parks outside the school gates and at the Church.

- Parents and children coming from the Tuam Road and Monivea Road side are requested to enter and leave the school grounds through the stiles (gaps) in the wall.
- Please ensure that your child does not walk on the wall.
- On entering the school grounds everybody is asked to follow the route set out by the green fence, i.e. to walk behind the prefab and into the playground.
- Parents and children coming from the Convent are requested to enter and leave the school grounds through the top yard.
- For those of you collecting your children at 1.30pm please be aware that there are classes working in the prefabs & in the classroom in the top yard. We would be grateful if your children could be kept reasonably quiet while passing. Please remind them also, that they are not allowed to go up and down the steps and ramps of the prefabs.
- Cars are not allowed inside the school grounds. Children should be dropped off and collected at the gates.
- All dogs are to be kept off school property, at all times, as they are a source of distress to some children.

MONEY

Please settle all money matters promptly so as to save time and to assist the school in running as efficiently as possible. The following procedure will ensure safe cash transaction and avoid confusion, error or loss:

- Money should be placed in a sealed envelope.
- Please write the following on the outside of the envelope:
 - Your child's name.
 - The amount enclosed.
 - The purpose for which the money is being forwarded.
